At the RAPIDS station, the RAPIDS Verification Officer will verify the contractor by SSN, and two forms of identification, one of which must be a picture ID. The Verification Officer will capture primary and alternate fingerprints and picture, and updates to DEERS and

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will then issue a CAC.

Issued CACs shall be for a period of performance not longer than three (3) years or the individuals contract end date (inclusive of any options) whichever is earlier.

The contractor shall return issued CACs to the DEERS office upon return from deployment, departure or dismissal of each contractor employee. A receipt for each card must be obtained and provided to the TA/COR.

A CAC cannot be issued without evidence that a National Agency Check with Written Inquires (NACI) has at least been initiated by the FSO. (C-JTSCC) EMPLOYEES OPERATING IN THE CENTCOM AREA OF RESPONSIBILITY (AOR)

DEC/2011

(a) Contractors and subcontractors at any tier shall ensure and provide satisfactory evidence that all locally hired employees, including Local National (LN), Third Country National (TCN), and U.S. employees, working on bases are screened and receive all required immunizations in accordance with USCENTCOM 021922Z Dec 11 Mod Eleven to USCENTCOM Individual Protection and Individual Unit Deployment Policy found on: <http://www2.centcom.mil/sites/contracts/Pages/GCP.aspx>. All immunizations will be given IAW Ref S. Refer to the military vaccine agency website (<http://www.vaccines.mil>).

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(1) U.S. Contractors may initially utilize a tuberculosis (TB) testing method of either a chest x-ray or TB skin test (TST), depending on the originating country of a contracted employee.

(i) Chest x-rays (CXR's), symptom survey, and Body Mass Index (BMI) shall be taken, and TSTs administered within 12 months prior to the start of deployment/employment. Contractors are required to bring in a physical copy of the pre-employment CXR film as it is the only way to verify interval changes should an active case of TB occur.

(A) Third Country Nationals (TCNs) and Local Nationals (LNs) cannot be screened with the TST. They need the pre-employment screening with a quality CXR, BMI and symptom survey.

(B) Small-Risk Nationals (SRNs), those with less than 25 TB cases per 100,000 persons annually (mostly expats from Europe and US), can be screened via the TST.

(ii) Annual re-screening for TCNs, and LNs will be performed with a CXR conducted by the Contractors medical provider or local economy provider who will look for interval changes from prior CXRs and review any changes in the symptom survey.

(iii) SRNs do not require annual TB re-screening. However, for a TB contact investigation, a TST or Interferon Gamma Release Assay (IGRA) is required.

(iv) For a contact investigation, all personnel with a positive TST or IGRA will be evaluated for potential active TB with a symptom screen, exposure history, BMI, and CXR. All cases of suspected or confirmed active TB must be reported to the theater Preventive Medicine (PM) physician and/or TB Consultant as soon as possible. TB reporting is required within 24 hours to the PM POC. Contact tracing, and medical coding have specific requirements. All Small-Risk National (SRN) contract personnel are required to be MEDEVACd out of theater, at the contractors expense, for treatment of active TB, after consultation with the Theater PM or TB Consultant. For SRN personnel, the contractor is responsible for management and compliance with all prescribed public health actions.

(v) Screening may be performed either by a licensed medical provider from the local economy or by the contractors licensed medical staffs. Contractors shall maintain medical screening documentation and make it available to the Contracting Officer upon request. (2) TB screening and documentation is a requirement prior to receiving badges to work in the CENTCOM Area of Operations. A copy of the TB screening documentation shall be provided to the responsible Base Operations Center prior to issuance of base access badges.

(b) LN and TCN contractor employees, including subcontractors at any tier, involved in food service, water and/or ice production facilities must be screened annually for signs and symptoms of infectious diseases. Contractors must ensure employees receive Typhoid and Hepatitis A (full series) immunizations in accordance with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention guidelines (e.g. typhoid vaccination booster is required every 2 years), in addition to the required TB tests. The contractor medical provider must complete a pre-placement examination to include a stool sample test for ova and parasites, and annual medical screening form or equivalent for food service, ice and water production workers.

(c) Proof of individual employee vaccinations shall be provided to the Contracting Officer and COR showing that their employees and their subcontractor employees at any tier have received the above vaccinations. The contractor shall maintain their employees vaccination records for examination by the Contracting Officer. The contractor shall ensure that their subcontractors at any tier maintain their respective employees vaccination records for examination by the Contracting Officer.

(d) The contractor is responsible for management and compliance with all prescribed public health actions regarding TB in the contracted personnel. The contractor also bears the responsibility of ensuring that adequate health management for TB (screening/diagnosis/treatment/isolation) is available at the contractors chosen health care provider for their contracted and subcontracted personnel. NOTE: Contractors are reminded of the requirement to comply with their contract and all regulatory guidance (DoD Instructions/Regulations, Federal Acquisition Regulation as Supplemented, and FRAGOs) as applicable regarding Medical Screening and Vaccination Requirements.

This requirement includes the prime's, and subcontractor's at all tiers, cargo and equipment. The contractor shall report any individual piece of equipment valued at \$50,000 or more. b. This reporting is required on Rolling Stock (RS), Non Rolling Stock (RNRS), and Twenty foot Equivalent Units (TEU). The following definitions apply to these equipment/cargo categories:

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(1) Rolling Stock (RS): All equipment with wheels or tracks that is self-propelled, or is un-powered and can be towed by a vehicle on a roadway. Also includes standard trailer mounted equipment such as generators, water purification equipment, and other support equipment with permanent wheels. Specific examples of RS include Wheeled Armored Vehicles (WAVS), Mine-Resistant Ambush-Protected (MRAP) family of vehicles (FOVS), and Highly Mobile Multipurpose Wheeled Vehicles (HMMWVS).

(2) Non Rolling Stock (RNRS): All equipment that is not classified as Rolling Stock. Includes equipment that is not trailer-mounted or originally designed to be driven or towed over a roadway.

(3) Twenty foot Equivalent Units (TEU): Standard unit for describing a ship's cargo capacity, or a shipping terminal's cargo handling capacity. One TEU represents the cargo capacity of a standard intermodal shipping container, 20 feet long, 8 feet wide, and 8.5 feet high. One TEU is equivalent to 4 QUADCONS and 3 TRICONS. One TEU has an internal volume of 1,166 cubic feet.

c. This data will be used by United States Forces-Afghanistan (USFOR-A) to assist in tracking the drawdown of Afghanistan. The contractor is responsible for movement of their own cargo and equipment. The data provided by contractors is for informational purposes only in order to plan and coordinate the drawdown effort. The Government assumes no responsibility for contractor demobilization except as stated in individual contract terms and conditions.

All warranty actions shall still be controlled by the performance standard outlined in paragraph C.2.

C.1.2. Unless otherwise specified, the contractor, as an independent contractor, and not as an agent of the Government, shall provide the necessary labor, services, and any equipment (which is not in the units inventory) to perform the specific work and services required by this contract (above -10 maintenance). The contractor shall not be responsible for welding, air conditioner maintenance and service, and body work, if the unit obtains these services locally. The Government will provide access to facilities (maintenance bays, tool room, etc.), training materials, equipment in the units inventory, and supplies (to include petroleum products) in order to allow the contractor to provide the most rapid support. The contractor shall provide technical and maintenance documentation necessary to perform the tasks called out in this contract. The contractor may also make alternate arrangements to perform the work and services required by this contract at locations other than military installations at contractors expense; the Government will procure necessary repair parts on a delivery order.

C.2. Performance Work Statement

The FSRs must have in-depth knowledge and expertise with all facets of U.S. Army HMEE-Is produced for the Army by JCB.

The contractor shall provide its employees personal tool kits, communications, and IT equipment (including satellite hookup where necessary). In the event the contractor is unable to provide communications, notify the PM and Contracting Officer. The contractor shall provide its employees with JCB, Inc. service and parts manuals, special tools, specific TMDE equipment to diagnose and repair vehicle or subsystem faults.

The contractor shall at all times be responsible for the conduct of its employees. The contractor shall promptly resolve to the satisfaction of the Government, all contractor employees performance and conduct problems identified by the Government. The contractor shall ensure continued performance IAW the terms and conditions of the contract, and failure to correct such problems may result in the Government directing the contractor, at the contractors own expense, to replace and, repatriate any employee who fails to comply with this language to adhere to instructions and general orders issued by a Combatant Commander or other Government-designated representative or authorized agent. Such action may be taken at the Governments discretion without prejudice to its rights under any other provision of this contract, including the Termination for Default Clause. If the contractor replaces an employee who fails to perform in accordance with this contract, the replacement is at the contractors expense and must be in place within 72 hours, unless otherwise directed by the contracting officer.

The contractor shall present a monthly status report via email (in contractor format) in accordance with CDRL A002, which identifies the hours expended and the number of HMEE-Is serviced per vehicle type.

C.2.2. CONUS/ OCONUS NON-CONTINGENCY SUPPORT

The contractor shall provide qualified maintainers and trainers as ordered by the Government, to serve as Field Service Representatives (FSRs) to support the U.S. Armys fleet of High Mobility Engineer Excavators Type I (HMEE-I) while this equipment is deployed in CONUS and OCONUS Non-Contingency locations. The contractor shall position the FSRs as directed by either the COR or PCO with input from the contractor, according to equipment density.

Some of the work may also require traveling on a temporary basis to other locations to provide assistance and support to U.S. Army HMEE-Is.

All contractor employees are authorized to work an eight hour per day workday, five days per week with the flexibility to work a 50 hour work week, six days per week, at no additional cost to the Government, to accommodate vehicle availability. The PCO may approve additional overtime work at a negotiated rate.

The Government reserves the right to add additional FSRs and sites for FSR service as the mission requirements change. In the event the Government requires additional Field Service Representatives (FSRs), the Government will provide the contractor with a minimum of 60 days lead time for CONUS and 120 days lead time for OCONUS. Additional FSRs and sites will be added by delivery order and shall be individually priced.

C.2.2.a. Field Service Representative (FSR) duties.

Maintenance and Technical Support. The contractor shall provide all scheduled and unscheduled maintenance support above the operator level, as defined in the HMEE-I Operator's Technical Manual (TM 5-2420-232-10) and Operator's Technical Bulletin (TB 5-2540-233-10).

The contractor is not required to exercise and maintain equipment left in any government storage site or Pre-positioned unless directed by the contracting officer in a DO.

The FSR shall conduct hand off of vehicles delivered during the life of this ICLS contract, and operator New Equipment Training associated with those vehicles. Other FSR duties shall include providing training, resolving technical issues, and providing updated training to previously-trained mechanics to ensure that they are fully aware of all changes and improvements made to U.S. Army HMEE-Is.

Name of Offeror or Contractor:**C.2.2.b. Material and Equipment.**

The Government will provide all facilities, MHE, material, and supplies (exclusive of repair parts which will be ordered under CLIN 0004 of the contract) to support the effort. The Government will also provide minimal field office facilities to include a desk, chair, basic office supplies, and electrical outlets. When an FSR is required to work on a vehicle, the Government will be responsible to recover the vehicle to an appropriate facility.

The contractor shall provide all transportation for the FSR.

C.2.3. Southwest Asia (SWA) SUPPORT

The contractor shall provide experienced and qualified maintainers, trainers and supply support personnel as ordered by the Government, to serve as Field Service Representatives (FSRs) to support the U.S. Army's fleet of High Mobility Engineer Excavators Type I (HMEE-I) while this equipment is deployed in the SWA AOR (Kuwait and Afghanistan). The contractor shall position the FSR as directed by either the COR or PCO with input from the contractor, according to equipment density.

Some of the work may also require traveling on a temporary basis to other installation sites within the SWA AOR to provide assistance and support to U.S. Army HMEE-Is.

All contractor employees are authorized to work a flexible 10 hour per day workday, seven days a week, to accommodate vehicle availability; or work a compressed schedule of not less than six days, 70 hours per week, at the discretion of the Site Manager or COR based on availability of Government facilities.

The Government reserves the right to add additional FSRs and sites for FSR service as the mission requirements change. In the event the Government requires additional Field Service Representatives (FSRs), the Government will provide the contractor with a minimum of 120 days lead time. Additional FSRs and sites will be added by delivery order/delivery order modification and individually priced.

Unless prohibited by international agreement, the Contracting Officer shall provide a Letter of Authorization (LOA) for deployed contractor personnel. This is the document contractor employees must carry with them as authorization for use of Government transportation, medical facilities, fuel, billeting, and other entitlements. Contractor employees are not authorized to use Invitational Travel Orders.

The FSRs will be given two (2) weeks of R&R leave in their country of residence after every six months of deployment. However, leave will be staggered to ensure one FSR remains in Theatre to provide support for US Army HMEE-Is. Airfare from Kuwait to their country of residence, and return trip, will be paid for by the Government IAW paragraph C.4. The Government shall provide transportation into and out of Afghanistan.

C.2.3.a. Field Service Representative (FSR) duties..

Maintenance and Technical Support. The contractor shall provide all scheduled and unscheduled maintenance support above the operator level, as defined in the HMEE-I Operator's Technical Manual (TM 5-2420-232-10) and Operator's Technical Bulletin (TB 5-2540-233-10).

The FSR shall conduct hand off and operator New Equipment Training in SWA. Other FSR duties shall include providing training, resolving technical issues, and performing all scheduled and unscheduled maintenance above the operator level in support of U.S. Army HMEE-I Systems. The FSRs may also be required to conduct on-the-job production line installation training for the AoA Kit for new military personnel, Government civilian personnel, and other contractor personnel deployed to the installation site. Training shall be to the level that site installation personnel are capable of installing and maintaining the AoA Kit without contractor oversight. The FSRs shall provide updated training to previously-trained mechanics to ensure that they are fully aware of all changes and improvements made to U.S. Army HMEE-Is.

The FSR shall verify the required parts then order them through the PM. The COR authorizes the parts based upon the FSR reports. The Government will verify the parts which are needed prior to issuance of a DO for the parts. The FSR shall then prepare the DA Form 3161 when provided with the required unit information (unit designation and Derivative UIC), and shall sign the DA Form 3161 on behalf of PM CE/MHE.

All FSRs must participate in training through the Individual Replacement Deployment (IRDO) activity located at Camp Atterbury in Indiana before deployment to SWA. The contractor shall provide data as required by the Government not later than 10 days after contract award, for each FSR deploying to SWA, to enable the Government to develop a Letter of Authorization (LOA) containing all the information that is needed to request a Call Forward, IRDO request, and data to input information into SPO Tracker (for ASAALT). The Government shall give the contractor not less than three weeks notice of the date at which the FSRs shall report to the Government designated IRDO site, i.e. Camp Atterbury, Indiana, for processing through IRDO. The contractor shall provide transportation for their personnel from point of origin to Camp Atterbury and return, at Government expense. The Government will provide transportation from Camp Atterbury to the area of operation and return. The website for Camp Atterbury is as follows:

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C.2.3.b. Material and Equipment

The Government will provide all facilities, material handling equipment (MHE), material, and supplies (exclusive of repair parts which will be ordered under CLIN 0004 of the contract) to support the effort. The Government will also provide minimal field office facilities to include a desk, chair, basic office supplies, and electrical outlets. When an FSR is required to work on a vehicle, the Government will be responsible to recover the vehicle to a secure facility. The Government will furnish on-site transportation for contractor employees located in Afghanistan.

The contractor shall be required to provide transportation for employees working in Kuwait, at Government expense. Contractor is authorized Government fuel at no cost to the contractor.

The Government will provide transportation into and out of Afghanistan for both 1) FSRs and 2) equipment located in Kuwait. The flights into and out of Afghanistan shall be by military aircraft.

C.2.3.c. RESERVED

C.2.3.d. Living Conditions.

The Government will provide housing and drop laundry services for the contractor employees in Afghanistan. The contractor shall be responsible for housing for contractor employees working within Kuwait.

As authorized in the Letter of Authorization or elsewhere in this contract, contractor employees will be provided Government subsistence which includes meals, billeting, emergency medical care, emergency dental care, and access to morale and welfare activities and available chaplains. If subsistence changes during deployment (e.g. the Combatant Commander or subordinate Commander changes the authorizations), the contractor must notify the Contracting Officer.

While performing duties IAW terms and conditions of the contract, the Service Theater Commander will provide force protection to the contractor employees commensurate with that given to Service/Agency (e.g. Army, Navy) civilians in the operations area.

Contractor employees located in Afghanistan may be required to leave their home base to perform off-site troubleshooting and/or repair. However, in any case the Government will first recover the vehicle to a secure location (e.g. another base - ref. C.2.3.b.). In such cases, the Government will provide secured transportation for the FSR, tools, equipment and parts, to and from the vehicle location. In addition, as long as the FSR must remain at the remote location, the Government will provide all services listed above in this paragraph, as though the FSR were at the home base.

As required by the operational situation, the Government may at its discretion relocate FSRs (who are citizens of the United States or aliens in resident in the United States) to a safe area or evacuate them from the area of operations. The U.S. State Department has responsibility for evacuation of non-essential personnel.

The contractor shall ensure that each employee who is hired by or for the contractor (including subcontractors) and who may be required to deploy in support of military operations acknowledges in writing that they understand the danger, stress, physical hardships, and field living conditions that are possible if the employee deploys in such support. The contractor shall ensure that contents of this paragraph are included in all subcontracts.

Due to further force security issues and concerns in theater, many commands are asking for verification of the status of our contractors security background. As a result, the contractor shall maintain a completed background check on file for each employee that will be deployed.

C.2.3.e. Medical Information.

Prior to deployment, the contractor shall ensure that all deployable personnel are medically and physically fit to endure the rigors of deployment in support of a military operation. Guidance on medical information that is to be provided prior to arrival at Camp Atterbury can be found at the IRDO website provided in paragraph C. 2. 3. a., above, under. Annex II, titled IRDO Camp Atterbury Medical Prerequisites. Employees who fail to meet medical or fitness standards, or who become unfit through their own actions, will be removed from the area of operations and replaced at the contractors expense. All personnel must have a complete set of immunizations and inoculations for entry into SWA.

Deploying contractor employees shall carry with them a minimum of a 180 day supply of any medication they require. Military facilities will not be able to replace many medications required for routine treatment of chronic medical conditions such as high blood pressure, heart conditions, asthma, and arthritis. Contractor employees shall review both the amount of the medication and its suitability in the foreign area with their personal physician and make any necessary adjustments prior to deployment.

If glasses are required, contractor employees shall deploy with two pairs of glasses and a current prescription. Copies of the prescription will be provided by the employee to the IRDO, Camp Atterbury, so that eyeglass inserts for use in a compatible chemical protective mask can be prepared.

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The Government does require a medical screening at Camp Atterbury for FDA approved immunizations, which shall include DNA sampling.

The Government will provide the contractor employees with Chemical Defensive Equipment (CDE) familiarization training commensurate with the training provided to Department of Defense civilian employees. The training and equipment will be provided at Camp Atterbury for employees traveling from CONUS.

The Government will provide the contractor employees with the necessary Isolated Personnel Report (ISOPREP) and Survival Evasion Resistance Escape (FPI/SERE) training. This training will be conducted at Camp Atterbury.

The contractor shall ensure that all deploying individuals have the required identification tags and cards prior to deployment. In addition to the DD FM 489 (Geneva Convention Card) issued at the point of deployment, all contractor employees will be issued personal identification tags and Common Access Cards (CAC), if available before deployment. Personal identification tags will include the following information: full name, social security number, blood type, and religious preference. Contractor employees will maintain all issued cards and tags on their person at all times while OCONUS. These cards and tags shall be obtained through Camp Atterbury and shall be promptly returned to the Government upon redeployment. The contractor shall ensure that their employees obtain any appropriate VISAs (Applicable if an FSR is to be stationed in Kuwait) before they will be allowed to enter Camp Atterbury. Additional information regarding entry into Afghanistan Per the Dept of State Country entrance requirements is provided as follows:

ENTRY / EXIT REQUIREMENTS FOR U.S. CITIZENS: A passport and valid visa are required to enter and exit Afghanistan. Afghan entry visas are not available at Kabul International Airport. U.S. citizens who arrive without a visa are subject to confiscation of their passport and face heavy fines and difficulties in retrieving their passport and obtaining a visa, as well as possible deportation. U.S. citizens arriving in the country via military air usually have considerable difficulties if they choose to depart Afghanistan on commercial air, because their passports are not stamped to show that they entered the country legally. Those coming on military air should move quickly after arrival to legalize their status if there is any chance they will depart the country on anything other than military air. Travelers may be asked to register with a representative of the Ministry of Interiors Foreigners Registration Office upon arrival at Kabul International Airport. Upon registration, the traveler will be issued a card that they should surrender upon departure. Immigration authorities in Afghanistan have also implemented a fingerprinting system for all foreign visitors upon entry to the country with the exception of diplomats and ISAF personnel traveling on official orders. Visit the Embassy of Afghanistans website for the most current visa information. The consular office of the Embassy of Afghanistan is located at 2233 Wisconsin Avenue, NW, Suite 216, Washington, DC 20007, telephone 202-298-9125

The contractor employees accompanying the force are not authorized to wear military uniform, except for specific items required for safety and security. The Combatant Commander, subordinate Joint Force Commander (JFC), or Army Force (ARFOR) Commander may require that contractor employees be issued and be prepared to wear Organizational Clothing and Individual Equipment (OCIE), to include Chemical, Biological, and Radiological Element (CBRE) and High-Yield Explosive defensive equipment, necessary to ensure contractor personnel safety and security. The contractor employees shall sign for all issued OCIE to acknowledge receipt and acceptance of responsibility for the proper maintenance and accountability of the OCIE. The contractor employees shall return all issued OCIE to the Government at the place of issue unless directed otherwise by the Contracting Officer. The Contracting Officer will require the contractor to reimburse the Government for OCIE lost, stolen, or damaged due to contractor negligence or misconduct.

The contractor shall ensure that deployed employees possess the required licenses to operate all vehicles or equipment necessary to perform contract tasks in the theater of operations. Before operating any military owned or leased vehicles or equipment, the contractor employee shall provide proof of license (issued by an appropriate Governmental authority) to the unit or agency issuing the vehicles or equipment.

Contractor employees deployed in support of U.S. military operations are not permitted to carry personally owned firearms. Contractor employees normally shall not be armed during active military operations; however, the Combatant Commander may authorize issue of standard military side arms and ammunition to selected personnel for personal self-defense. In this case, weapons familiarization, qualification, and briefings on rules of engagement, shall be provided to the contractor employees, completed at Camp Atterbury. Even if authorized, acceptance of weapons by the personnel is voluntary, and must also be permitted by their employer.

Before deployment, the contractor shall ensure that each contractor employee completes at least three (3) DD Forms 93, Record of Emergency Data Card. One completed form is for Camp Atterbury, one copy for the Armys Casualty & Memorial Affairs Operations Center (CMAOC), and one copy for the Army Materiel Command (AMC) Logistics Support Element (LSE) Contractor Coordination Cell (CCC) or other designated liaison.

As Executive Agent for mortuary affairs, the Army will facilitate the notification of Next of Kin (NOK) in the event that a U.S. citizen contractor employee accompanying the force OCONUS dies, requires evacuation due to injury, or is reported missing. The Department of the Army will ensure that the contractor notifies the employees primary and secondary NOK. In some cases, an Army notification officer may accompany the employers representative. Notification support by the Army is dependent upon each contractor employee completing and updating as necessary, the DD Form 93, Record of Emergency Data Card. The Contractor is responsible for the evacuation of contractor employee remains from Kuwait.

The contractor shall ensure that health and life insurance benefits provided to its deploying employees are in effect in the theater of operations and allow traveling in military vehicles.

C.2.4 RESERVED

C.2.5 Parts Usage and Maintenance Report

The contractor shall submit a Parts Usage and Maintenance report IAW CDRL A001 monthly to the Government. The report shall address all scheduled and unscheduled maintenance actions as well as all parts used to maintain the vehicles during the reporting period. In addition to what is required by the Data Item Description (DID), the report shall contain the following information (additional information can be included at the contractors discretion):

Vehicle serial number

A statement identifying the problem and its effect

The date on which the contractor was first notified or vehicle became available

The resolution and date resolved (or expected resolution and date to be achieved)

Repairable parts returned, repaired, and issued

Indicate if maintenance action was warranty related

Scheduled services conducted

Status/problems/discussions

Category of parts used (Push Package part, Spare Parts Package part, or NMWR part)

Recommended updates to Push Packages (additions, deletions, quantity changes, etc.)

Every six (6) months, the report shall also include the results of the physical inventory of the Push Packages.

C.2.6. DD Form 314

Until the unit is under organic support, the contractor shall prepare, develop, and update the DD Form 314 for each vehicle, with the units participation so that once the unit achieves organic support, it can prepare the document independently. Initially, the HMEI may not be loaded into the Unit Level Logistics System (ULLS) or the Standard Army Maintenance System (SAMS). Therefore, the contractor shall initially develop and update a DD Form 314 for each vehicle with the gaining unit observing and participating in development. The form will serve as a record of scheduled and performed unit level services (including lubrication services), and to record NMC time. The DD Form 314 can be used as supporting documentation for the Parts Usage and Maintenance Report (CDRL A001). Instructions for preparing the DD Form 314 are contained in paragraph 3-9 of Department of the Army Pamphlet (DA PAM) 7508, The Army Maintenance Management System (TAMMS) Users Manual (22 August 2005). DA PAM 750-8 can be found on the Army Publishing Directorate (APD) web site at: http://www.apd.army.mil/pdffiles/p750_8.pdf

C.3. Special Training Events and Training Exercises

C.3.1. National Training Center, Fort Irwin, California (NTC) (CLIN 0005). When required by a delivery order, the contractor shall provide support for Special training Events IAW general FSR duties described in paragraph C.2.2. The days shall be clarified in each delivery order, but typically this training event will span 42 days. The contractor shall be capable of traveling to the units in a vehicle provided by the contractor. If the contractor is unable to travel in a commercial vehicle to the training area, the unit shall be responsible for transporting the contractor to their desired location.

C.3.2 Joint Readiness Training Center, Fort Polk, Louisiana (JRTC) (CLIN 0006). When required by a delivery order the contractor shall provide support for Special training Events IAW general FSR duties described in paragraph C.2.2. The days shall be clarified in each delivery order, but typically this training event will span 28 days. The contractor shall be capable of traveling to the units in a vehicle provided by the contractor. If the contractor is unable to travel in a commercial vehicle to the training area, the unit shall be responsible for transporting the contractor to their desired location.

C.3.3. Other Special Training Events (PTA: Pohakuloa-HI, YTC: Yakima-WA, Germany: Grafenwoehr, Vilseck, and Hohenfels) (CLIN 0007). When required by a delivery order, the contractor shall provide support for Special training Events IAW general FSR duties described in paragraph C.2.2. The days shall be clarified in each delivery order, but typically this training event will span 28 days. The contractor shall be capable of traveling to the units in a vehicle provided by the contractor. If the contractor is unable to travel in a commercial vehicle to the training area, the unit shall be responsible for transporting the contractor to their desired location.

C.3.4 Field Training Exercises

When required by a delivery order, the contractor shall provide support IAW general FSR duties described in paragraph C.2.2 for Training Exercises at locations other than those for Special Training Events. For the purposes of the field training exercises, each day of support is a 24 hour workday, which will be detailed in the relevant delivery order.

C.3.5 During the operations period of training, the contractor shall be required to live in the same living conditions as the unit which the contractor is providing support (in a field environment, eating MREs, etc.). However, if this is not possible through no fault of the contractor, the contractor shall recover all costs associated with accommodation, travel, and subsistence by way of the authorized travel expenses (reference paragraph C.4).

C.3.5.1 The contractor shall provide a detailed Training Center report IAW CDRL A004.

C.4 Travel Expense - CONUS, OCONUS, & SWA (CLIN 0009)

C.4.1. If the contractor does have to travel in order to provide service to maintain the performance standard in this contract, then the contractor can travel up to 100 times per year prior to going back to the contracting officer for an increase in the travel limit numbers. The contractors travel is subject to the limitations in this paragraph and subject to the funded CLIN amount. Airfare expenses associated with the contractor's R&R (2 weeks for every 6 months deployed) shall apply in accordance with C.2.3. The contractor shall notify the contracting officer when they reach 75 trips or 75 percent of the funded travel costs per delivery order. At the time of notification, the contractor shall also provide the Contracting Officer with an estimate to complete. Calculations for per diem travel costs shall not exceed the standard per diem rates specified in the Joint Travel Regulations (JTR). Individual Task Orders will provide travel details for discreet projects beyond this estimate. The contractor shall only bill this CLIN for actual travel expenses incurred. If the contractor does not use all of the travel for the calendar year, the contracting officer can write a unilateral modification either to extend the Travel CLIN or to de-obligate the money, at no expense to the Government. The contractor shall provide a monthly report showing travel expenses IAW CDRL A003.

C.5 RESERVED

C.6 PARTS SUPPORT

The contractor shall provide repair parts as listed in Exhibits B-F. The parts shall be commercially packaged and shipped by expedited means. The parts shall be ordered by Delivery Order and FOB destination shipping of individual parts will be determined at the time of each order.

C.7 REPORTS

C.7.1 The contractor shall submit a monthly Parts Usage and Maintenance report IAW CDRL A001.

C.7.2 The contractor shall submit a monthly status report IAW CDRL A002.

C.7.3 The contractor shall submit a monthly report showing travel expenses IAW CDRL A003.

C.7.4 The contractor shall submit a Training Center report IAW CDRL A004.

C. 8 BILLING

C.8.1 The Contractor shall invoice the Government NLT than the 7th day of the month for the previous months effort.

C.9 DELIVERABLES

C.9.1 The Contractor shall, unless otherwise indicated, provide reports, analyses and other documentation in electronic format. Contractor shall use standard Microsoft Office Suite programs (e.g., MS Word, PowerPoint, Excel) in order to be compatible with the Government.

C.9.2 The Contractor shall prepare all deliverables in Contractor format using best in-house practices that will produce documents that are clearly written, describe accomplishments accurately, detail technical issues, and define risks and problems. The Contractor shall submit reports in electronic format whenever possible. Electronic format shall be compatible to Government computer systems.

C.9.3 The Government reserves the right to request supporting documentation for any report submitted by the Contractor.

C.10 MEETINGS

C.10.1 Start of Work (SOW) Meeting. Unless waived by the Contracting Officer for the Basic Contract and/or any given Task Order, the Contractor shall coordinate with the Contracting Officer to determine a mutually acceptable date for a Start Of Work meeting, which should be held within 15 days of award. The SOW meeting(s) may be accomplished by video or audio teleconference if all parties agree.

All non-manufactured wood used in packaging shall be heat treated to a core temperature of 56 degrees Celsius for a minimum of 30 minutes. The box/pallet manufacturer and the manufacturer of wood used as inner packaging shall be affiliated with an inspection agency accredited by the board of review of the American Lumber Standard Committee. The box/pallet manufacturer and the manufacturer of wood used as inner packaging shall ensure traceability to the original source of heat treatment.

Marking. Each box/pallet shall be marked to show the conformance to the International Plant Protection Convention Standard. The quality mark shall be placed on both ends of the outer packaging, between the end cleats or end battens; on two sides of the pallet. Foreign manufacturers shall have the heat treatment of non-manufactured wood products verified in accordance with their National Plant Protection Organization's compliance program. In addition, wood used as dunnage for blocking and bracing shall be ordered with ALSC certified marking for dunnage or the markings may be applied locally at two foot intervals.

D.2 Preservation and Packaging.

Each box/pallet shall be marked to show the conformance to the International Plant Protection Convention Standard. The quality mark shall be placed on both ends of the outer packaging, between the end cleats or end battens. Pallet markings shall be applied to the stringer or block on diagonally opposite sides and ends of the pallet and be contrasting and clearly visible. All dunnage used in configuring and/or securing the load shall also comply with https://www.ipcc.int/servlet/BinaryDownloaderServlet/133703_ISPM15_2002_with_Ann.pdf?filename=1152091663986_ISPM_15_2002_with_Annex1_2006_E.pdf&refID=133703 ISPM15 and be marked with an ALSC approved dunnage stamp, marked at two foot intervals (in the case of dunnage shorter than 2 feet, each piece must still have the mark present). Foreign manufacturers shall have the heat treatment and marking of non-manufactured wood products verified in accordance with their National Plant Protection Organizations compliance program.

D.2.6 Hazardous Materials (As applicable):

D.2.6.1 Hazardous Materials is defined as a substance, or waste which has been determined by the Secretary of Transportation to be capable of posing an unreasonable risk to health, safety, and property when transported in commerce and which has been so designated. (This includes all items listed as hazardous in Titles 29, 40 and 49 CFR and other applicable modal regulations effective at the time of shipment.)

D.2.6.2 When applicable, packaging and marking for hazardous material shall comply with the requirements herein for the mode of transport and the applicable performance packaging contained in the following documents:

The explanation shall identify each critical performance element, management decisions used to quantify each incentive element, reasons for the incentives, and a summary of all trade-off possibilities considered.

(2) The Contractor is not required to notify the Contracting Officer in advance of entering into any subcontract for which consent is not required under paragraph (c), (d), or (e) or this clause.

(f) Unless the consent or approval specifically provides otherwise, neither consent by the Contracting Officer to any subcontract nor approval of the Contractor's purchasing system shall constitute a determination --

(1) Of the acceptability of any subcontract terms or conditions;

(a) Definitions. As used in this clause--

"Combatant Commander means the commander of a unified or specified combatant command established in accordance with 10 U.S.C. 161.

"Designated operational area" means a geographic area designated by the combatant commander or subordinate joint force commander for the conduct or support of specified military operations.

"Law of war" means that part of international law that regulates the conduct of armed hostilities. The law of war encompasses all international law for the conduct of hostilities binding on the United States or its individual citizens, including treaties and international agreements to which the United States is a party, and applicable customary international law.

"Subordinate joint force commander" means a sub-unified commander or joint task force commander.

(b) General.

(1) This clause applies when Contractor personnel are authorized to accompany U.S. Armed Forces deployed outside the United States in--

(i) Contingency operations;

(ii) Humanitarian or peacekeeping operations; or

(iii) Other military operations or military exercises, when designated by the Combatant Commander.

(2) Contract performance in support of U.S. Armed Forces deployed outside the United States may require work in dangerous or austere conditions. Except as otherwise provided in the contract, the Contractor accepts the risks associated with required contract performance in such operations.

(3) Contractor personnel are civilians accompanying the U.S. Armed Forces.

(i) When authorized in accordance with paragraph (j) of this clause to carry arms for personal protection, Contractor personnel are only authorized to use force for individual self-defense.

(ii) Unless immune from host nation jurisdiction by virtue of an international agreement or international law, inappropriate use of force by contractor personnel authorized to accompany the U.S. Armed Forces can subject such personnel to United States or host nation prosecution and civil liability (see paragraphs (d) and (j)(3) of this clause).

(4) Service performed by Contractor personnel subject to this clause is not active duty or service under 38 U.S.C. 106 note.

(c) Support.

(1)(i) The Combatant Commander will develop a security plan for protection of Contractor personnel in locations where there is not sufficient or legitimate civil authority, when the Combatant Commander decides it is in the interests of the Government to provide security because--

(A) The Contractor cannot obtain effective security services;

(B) Effective security services are unavailable at a reasonable cost; or

(C) Threat conditions necessitate security through military means.

(ii) The Contracting Officer Representative will include in the contract the level of protection to be provided to Contractor

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personnel.

(iii) In appropriate cases, the Combatant Commander may provide security through military means, commensurate with the level of security provided DoD civilians.

(2)(i) Generally, all Contractor personnel authorized to accompany the U.S. Armed Forces in the designated operational area are authorized to receive resuscitative care, stabilization, hospitalization at level III military treatment facilities, and assistance with patient movement in emergencies where loss of life, limb, or eyesight could occur. Hospitalization will be limited to stabilization and short-term medical treatment with an emphasis on return to duty or placement in the patient movement system.

(ii) When the Government provides medical treatment or transportation of Contractor personnel to a selected civilian facility, the Contractor shall ensure that the Government is reimbursed for any costs associated with such treatment or transportation.

(iii) Medical or dental care beyond this standard is not authorized unless specified elsewhere in this contract.

(3) Unless specified elsewhere in this contract, the Contractor is responsible for all other support required for its personnel engaged in the designated operational area under this contract.

(4) Contractor personnel must have a Synchronized Predeployment and Operational Tracker (SPOT)-generated letter of authorization signed by the Contracting Officer in order to process through a deployment center or to travel to, from, or within the designated operational area. The letter of authorization also will identify any additional authorizations, privileges, or Government support that Contractor personnel are entitled to under this contract.

(d) Compliance with laws and regulations.

(1) The Contractor shall comply with, and shall ensure that its personnel authorized to accompany U.S. Armed Forces deployed outside the United States as specified in paragraph (b)(1) of this clause are familiar with and comply with, all applicable

(i) United States, host country, and third country national laws;

(ii) Provisions of the law of war, as well as any other applicable treaties and international agreements;

(iii) United States regulations, directives, instructions, policies, and procedures; and

(iv) Orders, directives, and instructions issued by the Combatant Commander, including those relating to force protection, security, health, safety, or relations and interaction with local nationals.

(2) The Contractor shall institute and implement an effective program to prevent violations of the law of war by its employees and subcontractors, including law of war training in accordance with paragraph (e)(1)(vii) of this clause.

(3) The Contractor shall ensure that contractor employees accompanying U.S. Armed Forces are aware

(i) Of the DoD definition of sexual assault in DoDD 6495.01, Sexual Assault Prevention and Response Program;

(ii) That the offenses addressed by the definition are covered under the Uniform Code of Military Justice (see paragraph (e)(2)(iv) of this clause). Other sexual misconduct may constitute offenses under the Uniform Code of Military Justice, Federal law, such as the Military Extraterritorial Jurisdiction Act, or host nation laws; and

(iii) That the offenses not covered by the Uniform Code of Military Justice may nevertheless have consequences to the contractor employees (see paragraph (h)(1) of this clause).

(4) The Contractor shall report to the appropriate investigative authorities, identified in paragraph (d)(6) of this clause, any alleged offenses under

(i) The Uniform Code of Military Justice (chapter 47 of title 10, United States Code) (applicable to contractors serving with or accompanying an armed force in the field during a declared war or contingency operations); or

(ii) The Military Extraterritorial Jurisdiction Act (chapter 212 of title 18, United States Code).

(5) The Contractor shall provide to all contractor personnel who will perform work on a contract in the deployed area, before beginning such work, information on the following:

(i) How and where to report an alleged crime described in paragraph (d)(4) of this clause.

(ii) Where to seek victim and witness protection and assistance available to contractor personnel in connection with an alleged

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offense described in paragraph (d)(4) of this clause.

(6) The appropriate investigative authorities to which suspected crimes shall be reported include the following

- (i) US Army Criminal Investigation Command at <http://www.cid.army.mil/reportacrime.html>;
- (ii) Air Force Office of Special Investigations at <http://www.osi.andrews.af.mil/library/factsheets/factsheet.asp?id=14522>;
- (iii) Navy Criminal Investigative Service at <http://www.ncis.navy.mil/Pages/publicdefault.aspx>;
- (iv) Defense Criminal Investigative Service at <http://www.dodig.mil/HOTLINE/index.html>;
- (v) To any command of any supported military element or the command of any base.

(7) Personnel seeking whistleblower protection from reprisals for reporting criminal acts shall seek guidance through the DoD Inspector General hotline at 800-424-9098 or www.dodig.mil/HOTLINE/index.html. Personnel seeking other forms of victim or witness protections should contact the nearest military law enforcement office.

(8) The Contractor shall ensure that Contractor employees accompanying the U.S. Armed Forces are aware of their rights to--

- (A) Hold their own identity or immigration documents, such as passport or drivers license;
- (B) Receive agreed upon wages on time;
- (C) Take lunch and work-breaks;
- (D) Elect to terminate employment at any time;
- (E) Identify grievances without fear of reprisal;
- (F) Have a copy of their employment contract in a language they understand;
- (G) Receive wages that are not below the legal in-country minimum wage;
- (H) Be notified of their rights, wages, and prohibited activities prior to signing their employment contract; and
- (I) If housing is provided, live in housing that meets host-country housing and safety standards.

(e) Pre-deployment requirements.

(1) The Contractor shall ensure that the following requirements are met prior to deploying personnel authorized to accompany U.S. Armed Forces. Specific requirements for each category may be specified in the statement of work or elsewhere in the contract.

(i) All required security and background checks are complete and acceptable.

(ii) All deploying personnel meet the minimum medical screening requirements and have received all required immunizations as specified in the contract. The Government will provide, at no cost to the Contractor, any theater-specific immunizations and/or medications not available to the general public.

(iii) Deploying personnel have all necessary passports, visas, and other documents required to enter and exit a designated operational area and have a Geneva Conventions identification card, or other appropriate DoD identity credential, from the deployment center. Any Common Access Card issued to deploying personnel shall contain the access permissions allowed by the letter of authorization issued in accordance with paragraph (c)(4) of this clause.

(iv) Special area, country, and theater clearance is obtained for personnel. Clearance requirements are in DoD Directive 4500.54, Official Temporary Duty Abroad, and DoD 4500.54-G, DoD Foreign Clearance Guide. Contractor personnel are considered non-DoD personnel traveling under DoD sponsorship.

(v) All personnel have received personal security training. At a minimum, the training shall--

- (A) Cover safety and security issues facing employees overseas;
- (B) Identify safety and security contingency planning activities; and
- (C) Identify ways to utilize safety and security personnel and other resources appropriately.

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(vi) All personnel have received isolated personnel training, if specified in the contract, in accordance with DoD Instruction 1300.23, Isolated Personnel Training for DoD Civilian and Contractors.

(vii) Personnel have received law of war training as follows:

(A) Basic training is required for all Contractor personnel authorized to accompany U.S. Armed Forces deployed outside the United States. The basic training will be provided through

(1) A military-run training center; or

(2) A web-based source, if specified in the contract or approved by the Contracting Officer.

(B) Advanced training, commensurate with their duties and responsibilities, may be required for some Contractor personnel as specified in the contract.

(2) The Contractor shall notify all personnel who are not a host country national, or who are not ordinarily resident in the host country, that

(i) Such employees, and dependents residing with such employees, who engage in conduct outside the United States that would constitute an offense punishable by imprisonment for more than one year if the conduct had been engaged in within the special maritime and territorial jurisdiction of the United States, may potentially be subject to the criminal jurisdiction of the United States in accordance with the Military Extraterritorial Jurisdiction Act of 2000 (18 U.S.C. 3621, et seq.);

(ii) Pursuant to the War Crimes Act (18 U.S.C. 2441), Federal criminal jurisdiction also extends to conduct that is determined to constitute a war crime when committed by a civilian national of the United States;

(iii) Other laws may provide for prosecution of U.S. nationals who commit offenses on the premises of U.S. diplomatic, consular, military or other U.S. Government missions outside the United States (18 U.S.C. 7(9)); and

(iv) In time of declared war or a contingency operation, Contractor personnel authorized to accompany U.S. Armed Forces in the field are subject to the jurisdiction of the Uniform Code of Military Justice under 10 U.S.C. 802(a)(10).

(f) Processing and departure points. Deployed Contractor personnel shall--

(1) Process through the deployment center designated in the contract, or as otherwise directed by the Contracting Officer, prior to deploying. The deployment center will conduct deployment processing to ensure visibility and accountability of Contractor personnel and to ensure that all deployment requirements are met, including the requirements specified in paragraph (e)(1) of this clause;

(2) Use the point of departure and transportation mode directed by the Contracting Officer; and

(3) Process through a Joint Reception Center (JRC) upon arrival at the deployed location. The JRC will validate personnel accountability, ensure that specific designated operational area entrance requirements are met, and brief Contractor personnel on theater-specific policies and procedures.

(g) Personnel data.

(1) The Contractor shall use the Synchronized Predeployment and Operational Tracker (SPOT) web-based system to enter and maintain the data for all Contractor personnel that are authorized to accompany U.S. Armed Forces deployed outside the United States as specified in paragraph (b)(1) of this clause.

(2) The Contractor shall enter the required information about their contractor personnel prior to deployment and shall continue to use the SPOT web-based system to maintain accurate, up-to-date information throughout the deployment for all Contractor personnel. Changes to status of individual Contractor personnel relating to their in-theater arrival date and their duty location, to include closing out the deployment with their proper status (e.g., mission complete, killed, wounded) shall be annotated within the SPOT database in accordance with the timelines established in the SPOT Business Rules.

(h) Contractor personnel.

(1) The Contracting Officer may direct the Contractor, at its own expense, to remove and replace any Contractor personnel who jeopardize or interfere with mission accomplishment or who fail to comply with or violate applicable requirements of this contract. Such action may be taken at the Governments discretion without prejudice to its rights under any other provision of this contract, including the Termination for Default clause.

(2) The Contractor shall have a plan on file showing how the Contractor would replace employees who are unavailable for deployment or

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who need to be replaced during deployment. The Contractor shall keep this plan current and shall provide a copy to the Contracting Officer upon request. The plan shall--

- (i) Identify all personnel who are subject to military mobilization;
- (ii) Detail how the position would be filled if the individual were mobilized; and
- (iii) Identify all personnel who occupy a position that the Contracting Officer has designated as mission essential.

(3) Contractor personnel shall report to the Combatant Commander or a designee, or through other channels such as the military police, a judge advocate, or an inspector general, any suspected or alleged conduct for which there is credible information that such conduct

- (i) Constitutes violation of the law of war; or

(ii) Occurred during any other military operations and would constitute a violation of the law of war if it occurred during an armed conflict.

- (i) Military clothing and protective equipment.

(1) Contractor personnel are prohibited from wearing military clothing unless specifically authorized in writing by the Combatant Commander. If authorized to wear military clothing, Contractor personnel must--

(i) Wear distinctive patches, arm bands, nametags, or headgear, in order to be distinguishable from military personnel, consistent with force protection measures; and

- (ii) Carry the written authorization with them at all times.

(2) Contractor personnel may wear military-unique organizational clothing and individual equipment (OCIE) required for safety and security, such as ballistic, nuclear, biological, or chemical protective equipment.

(3) The deployment center, or the Combatant Commander, shall issue OCIE and shall provide training, if necessary, to ensure the safety and security of Contractor personnel.

(4) The Contractor shall ensure that all issued OCIE is returned to the point of issue, unless otherwise directed by the Contracting Officer.

- (j) Weapons.

(1) If the Contractor requests that its personnel performing in the designated operational area be authorized to carry weapons for personal protection, the request shall be made through the Contracting Officer to the Combatant Commander, in accordance with DoD Instruction 3020.41, enclosure 2, paragraph 4.e.(2). The Combatant Commander will determine whether to authorize in-theater Contractor personnel to carry weapons and what weapons and ammunition will be allowed.

- (2) If the Contracting Officer, subject to the approval of the Combatant Commander, authorizes the carrying of weapons

(i) The Contracting Officer Representative may authorize the Contractor to issue Contractor-owned weapons and ammunition to specified employees; or

(ii) The Contracting Officer Representative may issue Government-furnished weapons and ammunition to the Contractor for issuance to specified Contractor employees.

- (3) The Contractor shall ensure that its personnel who are authorized to carry weapons--

- (i) Are adequately trained to carry and use them

(A) Safely;

(B) With full understanding of, and adherence to, the rules of the use of force issued by the Combatant Commander; and

(C) In compliance with applicable agency policies, agreements, rules, regulations, and other applicable law;

- (ii) Are not barred from possession of a firearm by 18 U.S.C. 922; and

(iii) Adhere to all guidance and orders issued by the Combatant Commander regarding possession, use, safety, and accountability of

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weapons and ammunition.

(4) Whether or not weapons are Government-furnished, all liability for the use of any weapon by Contractor personnel rests solely with the Contractor and the Contractor employee using such weapon.

(5) Upon redeployment or revocation by the Combatant Commander of the Contractors authorization to issue firearms, the Contractor shall ensure that all Government-issued weapons and unexpended ammunition are returned as directed by the Contracting Officer.

(k) Vehicle or equipment licenses. Contractor personnel shall possess the required licenses to operate all vehicles or equipment necessary to perform the contract in the designated operational area.

(l) Purchase of scarce goods and services. If the Combatant Commander has established an organization for the designated operational area whose function is to determine that certain items are scarce goods or services, the Contractor shall coordinate with that organization local purchases of goods and services designated as scarce, in accordance with instructions provided by the Contracting Officer.

(m) Evacuation.

(1) If the Combatant Commander orders a mandatory evacuation of some or all personnel, the Government will provide assistance, to the extent available, to United States and third country national Contractor personnel.

(2) In the event of a non-mandatory evacuation order, unless authorized in writing by the Contracting Officer, the Contractor shall maintain personnel on location sufficient to meet obligations under this contract.

(n) Next of kin notification and personnel recovery.

(1) The Contractor shall be responsible for notification of the employee-designated next of kin in the event an employee dies, requires evacuation due to an injury, or is isolated, missing, detained, captured, or abducted.

(2) In the case of isolated, missing, detained, captured, or abducted Contractor personnel, the Government will assist in personnel recovery actions in accordance with DoD Directive 3002.01E, Personnel Recovery in the Department of Defense.

(1) Contingency operations;

 00015)

(a) General. (1) This clause applies when Contractor personnel are required to perform in the United States Central Command (USCENTCOM) Area of Responsibility (AOR) and are not covered by the clause at DFARS 252.225-7040, Contractor Personnel Authorized to Accompany U.S. Armed Forces Deployed Outside the United States.

(2) Contract performance may require work in dangerous or austere conditions. Except as otherwise provided in the contract, the Contractor accepts the risks associated with required contract performance in such operations.

(3) Contractor personnel are civilians. When authorized in accordance with paragraph (h) of this clause to carry arms for personal protection, Contractor personnel are only authorized to use force for individual self-defense.

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- (4) Service performed by Contractor personnel subject to this clause is not active duty or service under 38 U.S.C. 106 note.
- (b) Support. Unless specified elsewhere in the contract, the Contractor is responsible for all logistical and security support required for Contractor personnel engaged in this contract.
- (c) Compliance with laws and regulations. (1) The Contractor shall comply with, and shall ensure that its personnel in the USCENTCOM AOR are familiar with and comply with, all applicable--
- (i) United States, host country, and third country national laws;
 - (ii) Treaties and international agreements;
 - (iii) United States regulations, directives, instructions, policies, and procedures; and
 - (iv) Force protection, security, health, or safety orders, directives, and instructions issued by the USCENTCOM Commander; however, only the Contracting Officer is authorized to modify the terms and conditions of the contract.
- (2) The Contractor shall ensure that Contractor employees are aware of their rights to--
- (A) Hold their own identity or immigration documents, such as passport or drivers license;
 - (B) Receive agreed upon wages on time;
 - (C) Take lunch and work-breaks;
 - (D) Elect to terminate employment at any time;
 - (E) Identify grievances without fear of reprisal;
 - (F) Have a copy of their employment contract in a language they understand;
 - (G) Receive wages that are not below the legal in-country minimum wage;
 - (H) Be notified of their rights, wages, and prohibited activities prior to signing their employment contract; and
 - (I) If housing is provided, live in housing that meets host-country housing and safety standards.
- (d) Preliminary personnel requirements. (1) Specific requirements for paragraphs (d)(2)(i) and (d)(2)(ii) of this clause will be set forth in the statement of work or elsewhere in the contract.
- (2) Before Contractor personnel begin contract performance in the USCENTCOM AOR, the Contractor shall ensure the following:
- (i) All required security and background checks are complete and acceptable.
 - (ii) All personnel are medically and physically fit and have received all required vaccinations.
- (e) Registration of Contractor personnel.
- (1) The Contractor shall use the Synchronized Predeployment and Operational Tracker (SPOT) web-based system to enter and maintain data for all Contractor employees covered by this clause, following the procedures in paragraph (e)(3) of this clause.
- (2) Upon becoming an employee under this contract, the Contractor shall enter into SPOT, and shall continue to use SPOT web-based system to maintain accurate, up-to-date information throughout the employment in the AOR. Changes to status of individual Contractor personnel relating to their in-theater arrival date and their duty location, to include closing out the employment in the AOR with their proper status (e.g., mission complete, killed, wounded) shall be annotated within the SPOT database in accordance with the timelines established in the SPOT business rules.
- (i) In all circumstances, this includes any personnel performing private security functions.
 - (ii) For personnel other than those performing private security functions, this requirement excludes anyone--
 - (A) Hired under contracts valued below the simplified acquisition threshold;

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(B) Who will be performing in the CENTCOM AOR less than 30 continuous days; or

(C) Who, while afloat, are tracked by the Diary message Reporting System

(3) Follow these steps to register in and use SPOT:

(i) SPOT registration requires one of the following login methods:

(A) A Common Access Card or a SPOT-approved digital certificate; or

(B) A Government-sponsored SPOT user ID and password or an Army Knowledge Online (AKO) account.

(ii) To register in SPOT:

(A) Contractor company administrators should register for a SPOT account at <https://spot.altess.army.mil>; and

(B) The customer support team must validate user need. This process may take two business days. Company supervisors will be contacted to validate Contractor company administrator account requests and determine the appropriate level of user access.

(iii) Upon approval, all users will access SPOT at <https://spot.altess.army.mil/>.

(iv) Refer SPOT application assistance questions to the Customer Support Team at 717-458-0747 or SPOT.helpdesk@us.army.mil. Refer to the SPOT Enterprise Suite Resource Center at <http://www.resource.spot-es.net/> for additional training resources and documentation regarding registration for and use of SPOT.

(4) The Contractor shall submit aggregate Contractor personnel counts at a minimum quarterly or as directed by the Contracting Officer by category (i.e. U.S. third country national or local national) of those Contractor personnel who are on contracts valued at more than the simplified acquisition threshold, but performing less than 30 days in the AOR (e.g. day laborers).

(f) Contractor personnel. The Contracting Officer may direct the personnel who fail to comply with or violate applicable requirements of this contract. Such action may be taken at the Government's discretion without prejudice to its rights under any other provision of this contract, including termination for default or cause.

(g) Military clothing and protective equipment.

(1) Contractor personnel are prohibited from wearing military clothing unless specifically authorized by the USCENTCOM Commander. If authorized to wear military clothing, Contractor personnel must wear distinguishable from military personnel, consistent with force protection measures.

(2) Contractor personnel may wear specific items required for safety and security, such as ballistic, nuclear, biological, or chemical protective equipment.

(h) Weapons.

(1) If the Contractor requests that its personnel performing in the designated operational area be authorized to carry weapons for personal protection, the request shall be made through the Contracting Officer to the USCENTCOM Commander, in accordance with DoD Instruction 3020.41, enclosure 2, paragraph 4.e.(2).. The USCENTCOM Commander will determine whether to authorize in-theater Contractor personnel to carry weapons and what weapons and ammunition will be allowed.

(2) If the Contracting Officer, subject to the approval of the USCENTCOM Commander, authorizes the carrying of weapons--

(i) The Contracting Officer may authorize an approved contractor to issue contractor-owned weapons and ammunition to specified employees; or

(ii) The Contracting Officer Representative may issue Government-furnished weapons and ammunition to the Contractor for issuance to specified Contractor employees.

(3) The Contractor shall ensure that its personnel who are authorized to carry weapons--

(i) Are adequately trained to carry and use them--

(A) Safely;

(B) With full understanding of, and adherence to, the rules of the use of force issued by the USCENTCOM Commander; and

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(C) In compliance with applicable Department of Defense and agency policies, agreements, rules, regulations, and other applicable law;

(ii) Are not barred from possession of a firearm by 18 U.S.C. 922; and

(iii) Adhere to all guidance and orders issued by the USCENTCOM Commander regarding possession, use, safety, and accountability of weapons and ammunition.

(4) Upon revocation by the Contracting Officer of the Contractors authorization to possess weapons, the Contractor shall ensure that all Government-furnished weapons and unexpended ammunition are returned as directed by the Contracting Officer.

(5) Whether or not weapons are Government-furnished, all liability for the use of any weapon by Contractor personnel rests solely with the Contractor and the Contractor employee using such weapon.

(i) Vehicle or equipment licenses. Contractor personnel shall possess the required licenses to operate all vehicles or equipment necessary to perform the contract in the area of performance.

(j) Evacuation. In the event of a non-mandatory evacuation order, the Contractor shall maintain personnel on location sufficient to meet contractual obligations unless instructed to evacuate by the Contracting Officer.

(k) Notification and return of personal effects. (1) The Contractor shall be responsible for notification of the employee-designated next of kin, and notification as soon as possible to the U.S. Consul responsible for the area in which the event occurred, if the employee--

(i) Dies;

(ii) Requires evacuation due to an injury; or

(iii) Is isolated, missing, detained, captured, or abducted.

(2) The Contractor shall also be responsible for the return of all personal effects of deceased or missing Contractor personnel, if appropriate, to next of kin.

(m) Changes. (g) If the Contractor does not have representations and certifications in SAM, or does not have a representation in SAM for the NAICS

2013-00014)

(a) This clause does not apply to small business concerns.

(b) Definitions. As used in this clause--

"Alaska Native Corporation (ANC)" means any Regional Corporation, Village Corporation, Urban Corporation, or Group Corporation organized under the laws of the State of Alaska in accordance with the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act, as amended (43 U.S.C. 1601, et seq.) and which is considered a minority and economically disadvantaged concern under the criteria at 43 U.S.C. 1626(e)(1). This definition also includes ANC direct and indirect subsidiary corporations, joint ventures, and partnerships that meet the requirements of 43 U.S.C. 1626(e)(2).

"Commercial item" means a product or service that satisfies the definition of commercial item in section 2.101 of the Federal Acquisition Regulation.

"Commercial plan" means a subcontracting plan (including goals) that covers the offerors fiscal year and that applies to the entire production of commercial items sold by either the entire company or a portion thereof (e.g., division, plant, or product line).

"Electronic Subcontracting Reporting System (eSRS)" means the Governmentwide, electronic, web-based system for small business subcontracting program reporting. The eSRS is located at <http://www.esrs.gov>.

"Indian tribe" means any Indian tribe, band, group, pueblo, or community, including native villages and native groups (including corporations organized by Kenai, Juneau, Sitka, and Kodiak) as defined in the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act (43 U.S.C.A. 1601 et seq.), that is recognized by the Federal Government as eligible for services from the Bureau of Indian Affairs in accordance with 25 U.S.C. 1452(c). This definition also includes Indian-owned economic enterprises that meet the requirements of 25 U.S.C. 1452(e).

"Individual contract plan" means a subcontracting plan that covers the entire contract period (including option periods), applies to a specific contract, and has goals that are based on the offerors planned subcontracting in support of the specific contract, except that indirect costs incurred for common or joint purposes may be allocated on a prorated basis to the contract.

"Master plan" means a subcontracting plan that contains all the required elements of an individual contract plan, except goals, and may be incorporated into individual contract plans, provided the master plan has been approved.

"Subcontract" means any agreement (other than one involving an employer-employee relationship) entered into by a Federal Government prime Contractor or subcontractor calling for supplies or services required for performance of the contract or subcontract.

(c) The offeror, upon request by the Contracting Officer, shall submit and negotiate a subcontracting plan, where applicable, that separately addresses subcontracting with small business, veteran-owned small business, service-disabled veteran-owned small business, HUBZone small business concerns, small disadvantaged business, and women-owned small business concerns. If the offeror is submitting an individual contract plan, the plan must separately address subcontracting with small business, veteran-owned small business, service-disabled veteran-owned small business, HUBZone small business, small disadvantaged business, and women-owned small business concerns, with a separate part for the basic contract and separate parts for each option (if any). The plan shall be included in and made a part of the resultant contract. The subcontracting plan shall be negotiated within the time specified by the Contracting Officer. Failure to submit and negotiate the subcontracting plan shall make the offeror ineligible for award of a contract.

(d) The offerors subcontracting plan shall include the following:

(1) Goals, expressed in terms of percentages of total planned subcontracting dollars, for the use of small business, veteran-owned small business, service-disabled veteran-owned small business, HUBZone small business, small disadvantaged business, and women-owned small business concerns as subcontractors. The offeror shall include all sub-contracts that contribute to contract performance, and may include a proportionate share of products and services that are normally allocated as indirect costs. In accordance with 43 U.S.C. 1626:

(i) Subcontracts awarded to an ANC or Indian tribe shall be counted towards the subcontracting goals for small business and small

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disadvantaged business (SDB) concerns, regardless of the size or Small Business Administration certification status of the ANC or Indian tribe.

(ii) Where one or more subcontractors are in the subcontract tier between the prime contractor and the ANC or Indian tribe, the ANC or Indian tribe shall designate the appropriate contractor(s) to count the subcontract towards its small business and small disadvantaged business subcontracting goals.

(A) In most cases, the appropriate Contractor is the Contractor that awarded the subcontract to the ANC or Indian tribe.

(C) The ANC or Indian tribe shall give a copy of the written designation to the Contracting Officer, the prime Contractor, and the subcontractors in between the prime Contractor and the ANC or Indian tribe within 30 days of the date of the subcontract award.

(D) If the Contracting Officer does not receive a copy of the ANCs or the Indian tribes written designation within 30 days of the subcontract award, the Contractor that awarded the subcontract to the ANC or Indian tribe will be considered the designated Contractor.

(2) A statement of--

(i) Total dollars planned to be subcontracted for an individual contract plan; or the offerors total projected sales, expressed in dollars, and the total value of projected subcontracts to support the sales for a commercial plan;

(ii) Total dollars planned to be subcontracted to small business concerns (including ANC and Indian tribes);

(iii) Total dollars planned to be subcontracted to veteran-owned small business concerns;

(iv) Total dollars planned to be subcontracted to service-disabled veteran-owned small business;

(v) Total dollars planned to be subcontracted to HUBZone small business concerns;

(vi) Total dollars planned to be subcontracted to small disadvantaged business concerns (including ANCs and Indian tribes); and

(vii) Total dollars planned to be subcontracted to women-owned small business concerns.

(3) A description of the principal types of supplies and services to be subcontracted, and an identification of the types planned for subcontracting to--

(i) Small business concerns;

(ii) Veteran-owned small business concerns;

(iii) Service-disabled veteran-owned small business concerns;

(iv) HUBZone small business concerns;

(v) Small disadvantaged business concerns; and

(vi) Women-owned small business concerns.

(4) A description of the method used to develop the subcontracting goals in paragraph (d)(1) of this clause.

(5) A description of the method used to identify potential sources for solicitation purposes (e.g., existing company source lists, the System for Award Management (SAM), veterans service organizations, the National Minority Purchasing Council Vendor Information Service, the Research and Information Division of the Minority Business Development Agency in the Department of Commerce, or small, HUBZone, small disadvantaged, and women-owned small business trade associations). A firm may rely on the information contained in SAM as an accurate representation of a concern's size and ownership characteristics for the purposes of maintaining a small, veteran-owned small, service-disabled veteran-owned small, HUBZone small, small disadvantaged, and women-owned small business source list. Use of SAM as its source list does not relieve a firm of its responsibilities (e.g., outreach, assistance, counseling, or publicizing subcontracting opportunities) in this clause.

(10) Assurances that the offeror will--

Reporting shall be in accordance with this clause, or as provided in agency regulations;
- (iv) Ensure that its subcontractors with subcontracting plans agree to submit the ISR and/or the SSR using eSRS;
- (v) Provide its prime contract number, its DUNS number, and the e-mail address of the offerors official responsible for acknowledging receipt of or rejecting the ISRs, to all first-tier subcontractors with subcontracting plans so they can enter this information into the eSRS when submitting their ISRs; and
- (vi) Require that each subcontractor with a subcontracting plan provide the prime contract number, its own DUNS number, and the e-mail address of the subcontractors official responsible for acknowledging receipt of or rejecting the ISRs, to its subcontractors with subcontracting plans.

(B) Monitoring performance to evaluate compliance with the programs requirements.

(vi) On a contract-by-contract basis, records to support award data submitted by the offeror to the Government, including the name, address, and business size of each subcontractor. Contractors having commercial plans need not comply with this requirement.

(e) In order to effectively implement this plan to the extent consistent with efficient contract performance, the Contractor shall perform the following functions:

(1) Assist small business, veteran-owned small business, service-disabled veteran-owned small business, HUBZone small business, small disadvantaged business, and women-owned small business concerns by arranging solicitations, time for the preparation of bids, quantities, specifications, and delivery schedules so as to facilitate the participation by such concerns. Where the Contractors lists of potential small business, veteran-owned small business, service-disabled veteran-owned small business, HUBZone small business, small disadvantaged business, and women-owned small business subcontractors are excessively long, reasonable effort shall be made to give all such small business concerns an opportunity to compete over a period of time.

(2) Provide adequate and timely consideration of the potentialities of small business, veteran-owned small business, service-disabled veteran-owned small business, HUBZone small business, small disadvantaged business, and women-owned small business concerns in all "make-or-buy" decisions.

(3) Counsel and discuss subcontracting opportunities with representatives of small business, veteran-owned small business, service-disabled veteran-owned small business, HUBZone small business, small disadvantaged business, and women-owned small business firms.

(4) Confirm that a subcontractor representing itself as a HUBZone small business concern is identified as a certified HUBZone small business concern by accessing the SAM database or by contacting SBA.

(5) Provide notice to subcontractors concerning penalties and remedies for misrepresentations of business status as small, veteran-owned small business, HUBZone small, small disadvantaged, or women-owned small business for the purpose of obtaining a subcontract that is to be included as part or all of a goal contained in the Contractors subcontracting plan.

(6) For all competitive subcontracts over the simplified acquisition threshold in which a small business concern received a small business preference, upon determination of the successful subcontract offeror, the Contractor must inform each unsuccessful small business subcontract offeror in writing of the name and location of the apparent successful offeror prior to award of the contract.

(f) A master plan on a plant or division-wide basis that contains all the elements required by paragraph (d) of this clause, except goals, may be incorporated by reference as a part of the subcontracting plan required of the offeror by this clause; provided--

(1) The master plan has been approved;

(2) The offeror ensures that the master plan is updated as necessary and provides copies of the approved master plan, including

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evidence of its approval, to the Contracting Officer; and

(3) Goals and any deviations from the master plan deemed necessary by the Contracting Officer to satisfy the requirements of this contract are set forth in the individual subcontracting plan.

(g) A commercial plan is the preferred type of subcontracting plan for contractors furnishing commercial items. The commercial plan shall relate to the offerors planned subcontracting generally, for both commercial and Government business, rather than solely to the Government contract. Once the Contractors commercial plan has been approved, the Government will not require another subcontracting plan from the same Contractor while the plan remains in effect, as long as the product or service being provided by the Contractor continues to meet the definition of a commercial item. A Contractor with a commercial plan shall comply with the reporting requirements stated in paragraph (d)(10) of this clause by submitting one SSR in eSRS for all contracts covered by its commercial plan. This report shall be acknowledged or rejected in eSRS by the Contracting Officer who approved the plan. This report shall be submitted within 30 days after the end of the Governments fiscal year.

(h) Prior compliance of the offeror with other such subcontracting plans under previous contracts will be considered by the Contracting Officer in determining the responsibility of the offeror for award of the contract.

(i) A contract may have no more than one plan. When a modification meets the criteria in 19.702 for a plan, or an option is exercised, the goals associated with the modification or option shall be added to those in the existing subcontract plan.

(j) Subcontracting plans are not required from subcontractors when the prime contract contains the clause at 52.212-5, Contract Terms and Conditions Required to Implement Statutes or Executive Orders Commercial Items, or when the subcontractor provides a commercial item subject to the clause at 52.244-6, Subcontracts for Commercial Items, under a prime contract.

(k) The failure of the Contractor or subcontractor to comply in good faith with--

(1) The clause of this contract entitled "Utilization Of Small Business Concerns;" or

The report shall include subcontract awards, in whole dollars, to small disadvantaged business concerns by North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) Industry Subsector. If the data are not available when the year-end SSR is submitted, the prime Contractor and/or subcontractor shall submit the Year-End Supplementary Report for Small Disadvantaged Businesses within 90 days of submitting the year-end SSR. For a commercial plan, the Contractor may obtain from each of its subcontractors a predominant NAICS Industry Subsector and report all awards to that subcontractor under its predominant NAICS Industry Subsector.

ALL OCCUPATIONS LISTED ABOVE RECEIVE THE FOLLOWING BENEFITS:

HEALTH & WELFARE: \$3.81 per hour or \$152.40 per week or \$660.40 per month

VACATION: 2 weeks paid vacation after 1 year of service with a contractor or successor; 3 weeks after 8 years, and 4 weeks after 20 years. Length of service includes the whole span of continuous service with the present contractor or successor, wherever employed, and with the predecessor contractors in the performance of similar work at the same Federal facility. (Reg. 29 CFR 4.173)

HOLIDAYS: A minimum of ten paid holidays per year, New Year's Day, Martin Luther King Jr's Birthday, Washington's Birthday, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Columbus Day, Veterans' Day, Thanksgiving Day, and Christmas Day. (A contractor may substitute for any of the named holidays another day off with pay in accordance with a plan communicated to the employees involved.) (See 29 CFR 4174)

THE OCCUPATIONS WHICH HAVE NUMBERED FOOTNOTES IN PARENTHESES RECEIVE THE FOLLOWING:

1) COMPUTER EMPLOYEES: Under the SCA at section 8(b), this wage determination does not apply to any employee who individually qualifies as a bona fide executive, administrative, or professional employee as defined in 29 C.F.R. Part 541. Because most Computer System Analysts and Computer Programmers who are compensated at a rate not less than \$27.63 (or on a salary or fee basis at a rate not less than \$455 per week) an hour would likely qualify as exempt computer professionals, (29 C.F.R. 541.400) wage rates may not be listed on this wage determination for all occupations within those job families. In addition, because this wage determination may not list a wage rate for some or all occupations within those job families if the survey data indicates that the prevailing wage rate for the occupation equals or exceeds \$27.63 per hour conformances may be necessary for certain nonexempt employees. For example, if an individual employee is nonexempt but nevertheless performs duties within the scope of one of the Computer Systems Analyst or Computer Programmer occupations for which this wage determination does not specify an SCA wage rate, then the wage rate for that employee must be conformed in accordance with the conformance procedures described in the conformance note included on this wage determination.

Additionally, because job titles vary widely and change quickly in the computer industry, job titles are not determinative of the application of the computer professional exemption. Therefore, the exemption applies only to computer employees who satisfy the compensation requirements and whose primary duty consists of:

(1) The application of systems analysis techniques and procedures, including consulting with users, to determine hardware, software or system functional specifications;

(2) The design, development, documentation, analysis, creation, testing or modification of computer systems or programs, including prototypes, based on and related to user or system design specifications;

(3) The design, documentation, testing, creation or modification of computer programs related to machine operating systems; or

(4) A combination of the aforementioned duties, the performance of which requires the same level of skills. (29 C.F.R. 541.400).

2) AIR TRAFFIC CONTROLLERS AND WEATHER OBSERVERS - NIGHT PAY & SUNDAY PAY: If you work at night as part of a regular tour of duty, you will earn a night differential and receive an additional 10% of basic pay for any hours worked between 6pm and 6am. If you are a full-time employed (40 hours a week) and Sunday is part of your regularly scheduled workweek, you are paid at your rate of basic pay plus a Sunday premium of 25% of your basic rate for each hour of Sunday work which is not overtime (i.e. occasional work on Sunday outside the normal tour of duty is considered overtime work).

HAZARDOUS PAY DIFFERENTIAL: An 8 percent differential is applicable to employees employed in a position that represents a high degree of hazard when working with or in close proximity to ordnance, explosives, and incendiary materials. This includes work such as screening, blending, dying, mixing, and pressing of sensitive ordnance, explosives, and pyrotechnic compositions such as lead azide, black powder and photoflash powder. All dry-house activities involving propellants or explosives.

Demilitarization, modification, renovation, demolition, and maintenance operations on sensitive ordnance, explosives and incendiary materials. All operations involving regrading and cleaning of artillery ranges.

A 4 percent differential is applicable to employees employed in a position that represents a low degree of hazard when working with, or in close proximity to ordnance, (or employees possibly adjacent to) explosives and incendiary materials which involves potential injury such as laceration of hands, face, or arms of the employee engaged in the operation, irritation of the skin, minor burns and the like; minimal damage to immediate or adjacent work area or equipment being used. All operations involving, unloading, storage, and hauling of ordnance, explosive, and incendiary ordnance material other than small arms ammunition. These differentials are only applicable to work that has been specifically designated by the agency for ordnance, explosives, and incendiary material differential pay.

**** UNIFORM ALLOWANCE ****

If employees are required to wear uniforms in the performance of this contract (either by the terms of the Government contract, by the employer, by the state or local law, etc.), the cost of furnishing such uniforms and maintaining (by laundering or dry cleaning) such uniforms is an expense that may not be borne by an employee where such cost reduces the hourly rate below that required by the wage determination. The Department of Labor will accept payment in accordance with the following standards as compliance:

The contractor or subcontractor is required to furnish all employees with an adequate number of uniforms without cost or to reimburse employees for the actual cost of the uniforms. In addition, where uniform cleaning and maintenance is made the responsibility of the employee, all contractors and subcontractors subject to this wage determination shall (in the absence of a bona fide collective bargaining agreement providing for a different amount, or the furnishing of contrary affirmative proof as to the actual cost), reimburse all employees for such cleaning and maintenance at a rate of \$3.35 per week (or \$.67 cents per day). However, in those instances where the uniforms furnished are made of "wash and wear" materials, may be routinely washed and dried with other personal garments, and do not require any special treatment such as dry cleaning, daily washing, or commercial laundering in order to meet the cleanliness or appearance standards set by the terms of the Government contract, by the contractor, by law, or by the nature of the work, there is no requirement that employees be reimbursed for uniform maintenance costs.

The duties of employees under job titles listed are those described in the "Service Contract Act Directory of Occupations", Fifth Edition, April 2006,

unless otherwise indicated. Copies of the Directory are available on the Internet. A links to the Directory may be found on the WHD home page at <http://www.dol.gov/esa/whd/> or through the Wage Determinations On-Line (WDOL) Web site at <http://wdol.gov/>.

REQUEST FOR AUTHORIZATION OF ADDITIONAL CLASSIFICATION AND WAGE RATE {Standard Form 1444 (SF 1444)}

Conformance Process:

The contracting officer shall require that any class of service employee which is not listed herein and which is to be employed under the contract (i.e., the work to be performed is not performed by any classification listed in the wage determination), be classified by the contractor so as to provide a reasonable relationship (i.e., appropriate level of skill comparison) between such unlisted classifications and the classifications listed in the wage determination. Such conformed classes of employees shall be paid the monetary wages and furnished the fringe benefits as are determined. Such conforming process shall be initiated by the contractor prior to the performance of contract work by such unlisted class(es) of employees. The conformed classification, wage rate, and/or fringe benefits shall be retroactive to the commencement date of the contract. {See Section 4.6 (C)(vi)} When multiple wage determinations are included in a contract, a separate SF 1444 should be prepared for each wage determination to which a class(es) is to be conformed.

The process for preparing a conformance request is as follows:

- 1) When preparing the bid, the contractor identifies the need for a conformed occupation(s) and computes a proposed rate(s).
- 2) After contract award, the contractor prepares a written report listing in order proposed classification title(s), a Federal grade equivalency (FGE) for each proposed classification(s), job description(s), and rationale for proposed wage rate(s), including information regarding the agreement or disagreement of the authorized representative of the employees involved, or where there is no authorized representative, the employees themselves. This report should be submitted to the contracting officer no later than 30 days after such unlisted class(es) of employees performs any contract work.
- 3) The contracting officer reviews the proposed action and promptly submits a report of the action, together with the agency's recommendations and pertinent information including the position of the contractor and the employees, to the Wage and Hour Division, Employment Standards Administration, U.S. Department of Labor, for review. (See section 4.6(b)(2) of Regulations 29 CFR Part 4).
- 4) Within 30 days of receipt, the Wage and Hour Division approves, modifies, or disapproves the action via transmittal to the agency contracting officer, or notifies the contracting officer that additional time will be required to process the request.
- 5) The contracting officer transmits the Wage and Hour decision to the contractor.
- 6) The contractor informs the affected employees.

Information required by the Regulations must be submitted on SF 1444 or bond paper.

When preparing a conformance request, the "Service Contract Act Directory of Occupations" (the Directory) should be used to compare job definitions to insure that duties requested are not performed by a classification already listed in the wage determination. Remember, it is not the job title, but the required tasks that determine whether a class is included in an established wage determination. Conformances may not be used to artificially split, combine, or subdivide classifications listed in the wage determination.
