Performance Work Statement (PWS)

PART 1

GENERAL INFORMATION

Program Manager (PM) Heavy Brigade Combat Team (HBCT) System Engineering Services

1.0 Scope: The purpose of this effort is to provide technical and system engineering expertise to the Program Manager of the Heavy Brigade Combat Team. This effort will support potential integration projects for PM HBCT family of vehicles which includes Active Protection Systems (APS), Counter Remote IED Warfare (CREW) IED Jammer Systems, PM IED-Defeat Efforts, Combat Identification (CID) Efforts, and C4ISR Global Positioning Systems (GPS) on all PM HBCT platform vehicles.

1.1 Background: PM HBCT requires system engineering and technical assistance to assist PM HBCT with the execution of its program requirements. These requirements typically include research and development projects, congressional add-on requirements, and technical and system engineering functional services.

1.2 Period of Performance: The period of performance for this task order is one (1) base year plus two (2) option years. The contractor is authorized to continue performing work until the 2,080 base hours and/or the 2,080 option period one hours and 2,080 option period two hours (if exercised) are exhausted; provided that-

(a) In no event shall the Contractor continue performance beyond one year from the date of issuance of this task order unless or until the option hours are exercised; and

(b) In no event shall the Contractor continue performance beyond the point where the hours authorized by this task order or option has been expended.

1.3 General Information

1.3.1 Contractor Quality Control: The Contractor shall develop and maintain an effective quality control program to ensure services are performed in accordance with this PWS. The Contractor shall develop and implement procedures to identify, prevent and ensure non-recurrence of defective services. The contractors quality control program is the means of assuring the work complies with the requirement of this PWS. The contractor shall provide a Quality Control Plan (QCP) within 7 days of task order award. The Government will notify the Contractor of acceptance or required modifications of the QCP no later than 30 days after QCP submittal. The QCP shall include a description of the inspection system to cover all services listed in the PWS. The description shall include methods for identifying and preventing defects in the quality of services performed. As a minimum the contractor shall develop quality control procedures that address the area identified in Technical Exhibit 1 Performance Requirement Summary. After acceptance of the quality control plan the contractor shall receive the contracting officers acceptance in writing of any proposed change to his quality control system.

1.3.2 Government Quality Assurance: The government shall evaluate the contractors performance under this contract in accordance with the Quality Assurance Surveillance Plan as Attachment 2. This plan is primarily focused on what the Government must do to ensure that the contractor has performed in accordance with the performance standards. It defines how the performance standards will be applied, the frequency of surveillance, and the minimum acceptable defect rate (s).

1.3.3 Government Remedies: The Contracting Officers Representative performing surveillance will document high quality performance (e.g. timely delivery of data, accuracy and quality content of reports) and ensure this record of performance becomes a part of the contractors past performance record for this order.

Remedies: Timely submission of all deliverables addressing all required content in a quality manner is paramount; therefore, contractor failure in this task will result in (1) withholding of payments until the Government can determine the ramifications of the below standard performance, (2) contractor correction at no additional fee to the Government and (3) documentation of negative past performance. If the contractor believes that there are excusable circumstances, the contractor shall inform the Contracting Officer. Excusable circumstances may result in adjustment of the consequences mentioned in this paragraph. This paragraph does not invalidate

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any of the usual rights allowed by the Inspection of Services clause.

1.3.4 Organizational Conflict of Interest: As a condition of award of this task order, the contractors eligibility for future contract awards or subcontract awards may be restricted regarding any current or future program managed system acquisitions. The contractor agrees, as specified in FAR Subpart 9.5, to outline the actions to be taken by the contractor during the performance of the task to avoid and mitigate any conflict of interest. The Contractor agrees that the Government or an authorized representative may, up to three years after acceptance of all programmatic documentation to be delivered under the task order, restrict the Contractors future participation in any resulting program managed system acquisition action(s). If the Contractor demonstrates to the Contracting Officer that there may be a possible conflict of interest arising out of an existing contract, the Contracting Officer shall take the necessary action to delete that requirement from this task order.

1.3.7 Hours of Operations/Place of Performance: The standard work week is Monday through Friday, consisting of 40 hours. The work week may be modified, or extended beyond 40 hours to meet mission requirements if approved by the COR. Contractor shall perform all tasks located in Part 3 of this performance work statement at the PM HBCT TACOM office located in Warren, MI.

1.3.8 Travel: Contractor personnel may be required to travel on an annual basis in order to perform this task order. The Government COR must authorize all travel in advance. Authorized travel shall be payable as a direct cost and vouchers for reimbursement of travel must be included with the monthly invoice and approved by the COR prior to payment. There will be no reimbursement for local travel in and around contractors place of performance (within 50 mile radius). The contractor shall provide a written certification, prior to travel, that funds are available on the travel CLIN to complete the travel. Contractor shall use the lowest available airfare and accommodations available during normal business hours. Reimbursement for lodging and incidental expenses will be considered reasonable and allowable to the extent the costs does not exceed the rates allowed by the Joint Travel Regulation as it applies to civilian employees of the U.S. Government . 1.3.9 Security Requirement: A top secret clearance is required to perform the tasks associated under this task order.

1.3.10 Contracting Officer Representative (COR): The COR is an individual designated in accordance with DFARS 201.602-2 and is authorized in writing by the contracting officer to perform specific technical functions. The contracting officer has designated _Ron Siegal_ as the contracting officers representative (COR) for this task order. The Contractor will receive a copy of the COR appointment letter after task order award that will specify the extent of the CORs authority to act on behalf of the contracting officer. The COR is not authorized to make any commitments or changes that will affect price, quantity, delivery or any other term or condition of this task order.

2.0 Utilities. All utilities located within the PM HBCT offices at TACOM, Warren, MI will be available for the contractors use in performance of duties outlined in this PWS. The contractor shall be responsible for operating under conditions that preclude the waste of utilities.

2.1 Facilities. PM HBCT will provide office space, office supplies, computer equipment, internet and web access, telephone and reproductions facilities as required. In assigning office space, special attention will be given to recognize the nature of services performed by the contractor.

3.0 Requirements.

3.1 Basic Services. The identified tasks below are specifically directed at supporting this contract and the execution of PM HBCT program requirements on all PM HBCT platform operations.

3.1.1 Task Area 1. PM HBCT Subject Matter Expertise (SME):

1. Provide analysis, evaluation, and assessments on military armored and armored cavalry service programs under PM HBCT supervision.
2. Provide analysis, evaluation, and assessments on the TRADOC requirements process which includes analysis on TRADOC requirements for Armor, Infantry, Engineer and Aviation proponentcy.
3. All analysis, evaluation, and assessments include impacts on each PM HBCT Ground Combat Vehicle Platform, to include:
 - Size, Weight and Power (SWaP)
 - CoSite Analysis
 - Mounting Configuration Conflicts
 - Interface and effects analysis with Vehicle Weapons Systems
 - Interface and effects analysis with Vehicle Fire Control and Vetrionics
 - Interface and effects analysis with vehicle Vetrionics Software
 - Interface analysis with Vehicle 2nd Gen FLIR and Optics
 - Vehicle Communications EMC/EMI/E3 Analysis
 - Effects to Vehicles Mission, Enemy, Terrain, Troops and Time Available (METT-T)
 - Analysis of Platform Specific Weapons Systems Blast/Muzzle Effects
 - Analysis of Platforms Variants Mission Essential Packages (MEPs)
 - Analysis of Platforms Variants Load Plans (BII, AAL, MREs, Water, Ammunitions, A/B-Bags, Ruck Sacks, etc)
 - Integration analysis with specific vehicle OIF/OEF Survivability Enhancements to include: TUSK, BUSK, TUSK II, BUSK II, CROWS, CSAMM
 - Analysis for changes to current Concept of Operations (CONOPS) and Tactics, Techniques and Procedures (TTPs)
 - Effects Analysis to Vehicle and Crewmember Training
 - Effects Evaluation and Analysis to Doctrine, Organization, Training, Materiel, Leadership, Personnel, and Facilities (DOTMLPF)
 - Interface with and Coordination with the TRADOC Capability Manager (TCM) office to determine valid requirements to determine if the PM proceeds with this request or integration effort based on mission priorities, 1-to-N Listing, ONS/JONS from OIF/OEF and if funding is available to support this request or effort.

3.1.2 Task Area 2. Active Protection System (APS) on PM HBCT platform vehicles:

1. Provide evaluation, analysis, and assessment of integration effects for all APS systems or components onto PM HBCT Ground Combat Platforms.
2. Provide analysis and assessment of potential development, integration, testing and fielding of the Short Range APS System and Long Range or 360 degree Full Spectrum APS Systems onto PM HBCT Ground Combat Platforms.
3. Provide ongoing PM HBCT Worldwide APS/ADS Technology Readiness Level (TRL) Evaluation and Assessment services for PM HBCT Senior Leadership.
4. Participate as an IPT team member on the Ground Combat Vehicle (GCV) APS IPT Team.
5. Maintain a Top Secret (TS) Clearance and provide services on Special Compartmentalized Intelligence (SCI) HBCT program.

3.1.3 Task Area 3. Counter Remote IED Warfare (CREW) RC/RF IED Jammer Systems on all PM HBCT platform vehicles:

1. Provide evaluation, analysis, and assessment of physical and electrical integration effects for all CREW Systems onto PM HBCT Ground Combat Platforms.
2. Provide ongoing CREW-2 "DUKE" RCIED Jammer A-kit CONUS fielding services for all PM HBCT Ground Combat Platforms.
3. Provide PM HBCT CREW-v3 engineering services for development, integration and testing for the CREW-v3 IED Jammer into/onto the M88 Family of Vehicles (FoV) and M1200 Armored Knight CREW-v3.
4. Provide conduction analysis and perform requirements review and integration issues on the IED jammers to include the CREW-v4 in the FY12-14 timeframe and the CREW-v5 in the FY15 timeframe.
5. Provide services for the CREW/CVRJ testing for Paladin/FAASV with new Chief of Station Armored Gun Shield, Paladin PIM, ODS-SA(A3-), Bradley Command Vehicle (BCV), and M1A1SA with the new Stabilized Commanders Weapons Station (SCWS) for updated DTC Safety Confirmation (SC) Testing and classified Capabilities and Limitation Reports (CLRs).

3.1.4. Task Area 4. PM IED-Defeat Efforts:

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1. Provide evaluation, analysis, and assessment of physical and electrical integration effects for PM IED-Defeat Systems onto PM HBCT Ground Combat Platforms.
2. Provide evaluation, analysis, and assessment of the PM IED Defeat Rhino 2.6/3.0 Passive Infrared (PIR) Defeat system and SPARKS Lightweight Mine Roller for development, integration, testing and fielding on PM HBCT ground combat platforms.

3.1.5 Task Area 5. Combat Identification (CID) Efforts:

1. Provide evaluation, analysis, and assessment of physical and electrical integration effects for Combat Identification Systems onto PM HBCT Ground Combat Platforms.
2. Provide PM HBCT services for Combat Identification (CID) with interface with PD TIMS for all Combat Identification development, integration, testing and fielding onto PM HBCT Ground Combat Platforms.
3. Provide evaluation, analysis, and assessment for potential development, integration, testing and fielding of the following Combat Identification Technologies:

Joint Cooperative Target Identification Ground-to-Ground (JCTI-G) New Effort
 Battlefield Target Identification (BTID)
 Optical Combat Identification System (OCIDS)
 Joint Cooperative Target Identification Ground-to-Dismount (G-D) or Radio Based Combat Identification/Radio Based Situational Awareness (RBCI/RBSA)
 Joint Cooperative Target Identification Air-to-Ground (A-G) RF Tags
 Recognition of Combat Vehicles (ROC-V)
 Combat Identification Panels (CIPs)
 Thermal Identification Panels (TIPs)
 Identify programmatic and technical issues that impact PM HBCT at Combat Identification Meetings, Conferences and IPTs

3.1.6 Task Area 6. C4ISR Global Positioning System (GPS) engineering on HBCT platform vehicles:

1. Provide evaluation, analysis, and assessment of integration effects for the PLGR/DAGR GPS Systems into/onto our PM HBCT Ground Combat Platforms.
2. Evaluation, Analysis and Assessment of physical and electrical integration effects for the new PM GPS GB-GRAM Module Chip efforts.

3.2 CDRLs / Deliverables:

3.2.1 Monthly Contractor Progress, Status and Management Report: The Contractor personnel shall electronically submit monthly status reports electronically to the COR in Contractor format. The report shall be a synopsis of contractor personnel activity for the previous month, including monthly accomplishments and discussion of anticipated activities for the following month. These reports shall also include amount of funds and number of hours expended; funds and hours remaining; detailed description of the task order status; actions items and responsible parties; outstanding issues or problems; and work effort completed to date to include all required deliverables requested in the statement of work. The Contractor personnel shall deliver the monthly status report by the 30th of each month (CDRL A001).

Performance Requirements Summary

The contractor service requirements are summarized into performance objectives that relate directly to mission essential items. The performance threshold briefly describes the minimum acceptable levels of service required for each requirement. These thresholds are critical to mission success.

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Trip Report shall be delivered in electronic format to the COR within 5 days of returning from travel.

3.3 Security Classification Specification

The contractor shall adhere to the requirements of the DD Form 254 (Attachment 0003) (Contract Security Classification Specification) for the protection of the unclassified information, CUI, and classified information, data, hardware, and software generated for or provided in support of the program. To preserve national security interest, the contractor shall ensure all aspects of the contract and work performed are evaluated for conformance with security procedures and standards. The contractor shall evaluate all products for security implications.

3.3.1 Classification

The highest classification associated with this contract is Secret. The contractor shall ensure all personnel meet clearance and access requirements. All Contractor personnel who do not already have a valid clearance must undergo a background investigation that turns out favorable. Then, once issued a clearance, each assigned employee must maintain that clearance during the period of performance in order to access Government databases and Local Area Network in accordance with Army Regulation AR 25-2 and AR 380-67. Refer to the DD Form 254 (Attachment 0003) for additional security and personnel requirements.

3.3.2 Controlled Unclassified Information (CUI) Requirements

CUI provided to or generated pursuant to this contract shall be protected. The procedures for the protection of CUI are outlined in the CUI Attachment (Attachment 0004).

3.3.3 Public Release Requests

The contractor shall screen all information submitted for determination of public release to ensure it is both unclassified and technically accurate. Refer to the Abrams, Bradley and PIM Security Classification Guides (Attachments 0005,0006,and 0007) on public release of information for additional information. All requests shall be submitted to the Project Manager ABCT Security Manager, ATTN: SFAE-GCS-ACT, 6501 East 11 Mile Rd, Warren, MI 48397-5000 for adjudication. The PM ABCT Program will require 45 working days to process the request and render a decision.

(1) Except for ABCT Program information previously approved for public release by the Government under the ABCT Program, the Contractor shall not release any ABCT Program information regarding the work performed under this contract outside of (i) the United States Government, (ii) its own facility, (iii) its subcontractors performing ABCT work at any tier, (iv) Associate Contractors, at any tier, and (v) any other individual or entity that is contractually bound to protect ABCT Program Information from public release without first obtaining approval for Public Release. PM ABCT information is any Program information on the ABCT effort.

(2) The Contractor shall submit all requests for public-release approval for a review by PM ABCT technical and Security Office personnel, culminating in a determination by the Public Affairs Officer (PAO) (in accordance with Clause 252.204-7000). The PAO, or authorized representative, will, after appropriate review, either authorize or reject the request to disseminate ABCT Program information publicly. Note that authorization may be given contingent on specified changes being made to the material for which public release has been requested.

3.3.4 Release of Information

The Contractor shall not release any information or data to third parties without the express written approval of the Procuring Contracting Officer.

3.3.5 Information Flowdown

The contractor shall ensure the security requirements and guidelines contained in section 3.3 is flowed down to U.S. subcontractors, teammates and consultants.

3.3.6 Operations Security (OPSEC) Requirements

The contractor is not required to produce an OPSEC Plan. All U.S. contractors with access to CUI or classified information shall be required to follow the ABCT OPSEC Plan (Section J, Attachment 0008). To ensure awareness of the ABCT OPSEC Plan, the contractor shall participate in Government provided annual training for all ABCT personnel on the contents of the ABCT OPSEC Plan. New personnel shall receive ABCT OPSEC Plan specific training provided by the Government within 30 days of program assignment.

I. Objective

This plan provides a quality surveillance strategy for Program Manager (PM) Heavy Brigade Combat Team (HBCT) System Engineering Support. The primary intent of the plan is to provide a basis for the contracting officer representative's (COR) evaluation of performance quality. Oversight of contractor performance will assure contract quality and consistency of services provided to TACOM. The plan will also afford the COR a proactive mechanism to preclude major deficiencies in performance and provide input for annual past performance evaluations.

II. Performance Indicators (Measures)

a. Meetings. The COR will determine whether the contractor has consistently satisfied the acceptable level of performance for attending meetings.

b. Progress. The COR will determine whether the contractor has consistently satisfied the acceptable level of performance for making progress on PM HBCT requirements.

c. Management Reports. The COR will determine whether the contractor has consistently satisfied the acceptable level of performance of Management Reporting.

III. Evaluation Methods

The COR will perform evaluations based on the indicators in paragraph II of this plan. The COR will initiate the following surveillance techniques.

a. Customer surveys will be conducted on an as needed basis which will be given to the contractor so that any customer satisfaction area requiring attention can be addressed by the contractor.
